



## Monoclonal Antibody Infusion Information

### (bamlanivimab and etesevimab Infusion)

It has been determined that you may be a candidate for a monoclonal antibody infusion, to help treat your COVID-19 infection. Bamlanivimab and etesevimab have not yet been approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for general use, but has been approved for emergency use for treatment of mild to moderate coronavirus disease of 2019 in adult and pediatric patients, meeting specific criteria.

Bamlanivimab and etesevimab is a monoclonal antibody used to treat COVID-19 infections in patients that meet certain qualifying criteria, therefore not all patients with COVID-19 infections should receive this treatment.

Your provider has, or will request you to be considered for treatment with bamlanivimab and etesevimab.

#### Not all patients will be eligible to receive this treatment.

-If your provider requests it you **are an appropriate candidate**, then you will be contacted by the Morris Hospital scheduling department to schedule this infusion at a dedicated area of Morris Hospital for bamlanivimab and etesevimab infusions.

-You will be entering through an alternate hospital entrance, off of the corner of Lisbon and High St, where we are also performing drive up COVID testing.

-If you **are not an appropriate candidate** and will not receive the infusion, a representative from your provider's office or the hospital will contact you to let you know that you will not be receiving the infusion.

**Please know that bamlanivimab and etesevimab is currently in very low and inconsistent supply** since it is allocated to healthcare facilities in limited quantities, so that will affect the availability to patients.

If you do receive treatment with bamlanivimab and etesevimab, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommends COVID-19 vaccination be deferred for at least 90 days after treatment with a monoclonal antibody for COVID-19.
